Presidential Address

Gentlemen.

Since we had met in this Hall for the Annual General Meeting of the Association for the last session we have passed through another twelve months of anxious time created by the world situation specially with the enemy at our very door, and hundred and thousands of our country men suffering from want of food and clothings; but I am glad to say that our Association has been able to maintain the standard of its activities much the same as in previous years. On the other hand the organisation which the Association had started for procuring food for its members in collaboration with the Bengal National Chamber of Commerce at a very critical time was very laudable indeed.

Gentlemen, the Secretary in his report has placed before you the financial position of the Association very lucidly but it is not as satisfactory as it should be for an Association like ours; it is at present, as you all see, only just enough to keep the show going, and is not elastic enough to allow us to earmark any portion of the funds to be utilised in imparting cultural training to the junior members of the Association. It has been always the intention of the older members of this Association like myself to make this Association a training ground for the cultural improvement of the junior members so that they may in time be turned into useful members of the profession. To this end it should be the bounden duty of the Executive Committee to find out ways and means to improve the financial condition of the Association so that a fund may

be created for offering a prize for the best essay or articles on different Engineering subjects, selected by the Council, to be, competed for by the junior members each year.

Gentlmen, it has been argued on several occasions, whether it is desirable to run this Association at all when a Chartered Institution is already in existence in the country's and that our association if allowed to run would seem a subservient body. This is a controversial point which is not usual to be discussed on an occasion like this; but without entering into the controversial side of it, it may not be out of place to mention that running of parallel institutions the aims and objects of which are identical, is yet a healthy sign for the cultural development of the people in a country in a democratic Though it is generally agreed that the standard for allowing technical men to come within our folds should be raised. yet exigencies of circumstances have taught us to revise our opinion about the qualifications necessary for the eligibility of persons to become members of our association or otherwise associated with our institution. We had started our Association in peace time conditions and had framed our constitution embodying rules for membership depending mostly on Academical qualifications of the applicants and positions held by them in professional service; but if we allow the standard to sontinue and do not assommodate ourselves to the circumstances by bringing within our folds men who have opened out fields in the technical line; we may suffer financially and otherwise: Peace time standards should not always be the ruling or guiding principle of the Association.

The present war time conditions have caused to grow Up small industries for manufacturing finished articles for purposes of war under the direction of the Supply Department of the Government and it is seen that these articles are in no way inferior to imported articles. As the owners of most of these concerns are men who may not fall under the categories which our articles of Association allow them to be included as members of our association we would try to bring them within our folds if they wish themselves to be so associated so that the institution may boast of having included in Jits folds primite who have really done some useful work in bringing this devastating war to a successful termination.
