THE GRASSES OF BURDWAN DISTRICT, WEST BENGAL

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ABSTRACT

The object of the present investigation is to provide an account of the grasses of Burdwan. 75 grasses, out of which 45 belong to sub-family *Panicoideae* and 30 to the sub-family *Pooideae*, are reported from Burdwan District (22°56' & 25°53' N and 86°48' & 88°25' E). The habit, habitat, ecological notes and economic uses have been given. Some grasses recorded from Burdwan District appear to be very recent additions to the grass flora of West Bengal,

INTRODUCTION

The first account of the grasses of Bengal was given by Prain (1903). The grasses of 24-Parganas were studied by Majumder (1956) and very recently the account of the grasses and grass land type of West Bengal was given by Chaudhuri (1965). But complete exploration of grasses of many districts of West Bengal has, not so far been done. Some species of grasses from the adjoining areas have found their way to many regions of Bengal.

The sheets of the grasses of Burdwan (West Bengal) preserved in the Central National Herbarium, Calcutta, were examined. Sheets now being sent here by Botanists of that area for identification have also been consulted. Collection has also been made in Burdwan Town. Field notes have been taken. These have led to more information about the grasses of that area.

The district of Burdwan, is situated between $22^{\circ}56' \& 25^{\circ}53'$ N and $86^{\circ}48' \& 88^{\circ}25'$ E. The area of the district is 7034 sq. km (statistical abstract 1961). The eastern portion comprising Burdwan, Kalna and Katwa Sub-divisions with a total area of 5371 sq. km is a wide alluvial plain enclosed by the Ajoy, the Bhagirathi and the Damodar rivers. To the West (Asansol Sub-division), the district narrows to a mere strip of rocky, undulating land, some 24.15 km wide, lying between the Ajoy and the Damodar rivers.

The mean annual temperature is 27°C and the average annual rainfall is 1500 mm.

The whole of the western and a large part of the eastern portions of the district are formed from the debris of the hills of Manbhum, Singhbhum and the Santal Parganas. The soil is partly laterite clay, more or less altered, and partly a red coloured course-grained sand.

ENUMERATION

POACEAE

Sub-Family: PANICOIDEAE Tribe: Andropogoneae

Bothriochloa intermedia (R. Br.) A. Camus var. punctata (Roxb.) Keng

A stoutish perennial grass, stems 0.9-1.8 m high, a good fodder.

Burdwan Raj College, Burdwan, Dutta 139 (CAL). B. pertusa (Linn.) A. Camus

Very variable in habit, 0.6-1.8 m in height slender. The plants growing with *Dichanthium annulatum*. It is a good fodder grass.

Western side of Golaphag, Burdwan, 28-11-1966, Banerjee 4833, 0.6-1.8 m in height (CAL).

Chrysopogon aciculatus (Retz.) Trin.

Very common on village grazing grounds. Flowers from August onwards. Weed of cultivated ground.

Cymbopogon schoenanthus (Linn.) Spreng.

A tall, erect grass, 0.9-1.8 m height "Camelgrass oil" is distilled from the leaves and roots (Bor l.c.).

Dichanthium annulatum (Forssk.) Stapf

Common in fields throughout the area with Bothriochloa pertusa, an average height 1.2 m. Flowers in the cold weather. A very excellent fodder grass.

Golaphag, Burdwan, 28-11-1966, Banerjee 4825, common along the road side, very luxuriant growth, 1.2 m height (CAL); Panagarh Army Base, West Bengal, 17-1-1956, Guha 307 (CAL).

D. aristatum (Poir.) C. E. Hubb.

It has not been reported from Bengal by Prain,

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Majumdar or Chaudhuri. Very recently it has been recorded from Bengal by Jain & Banerjee (1967).

Ranigunj, Dec. 1866, Kurz s.n., in grassy places of the low marshes (CAL).

Eulalia trispicata (Schult.) Henr.

An erect, tufted grass, 0.6-0.9 m in height. Burdwan, Dutta 137 (CAL).

Heteropogon contortus (Linn.) P. Beauv. ex Roem. et Schult.

A densely tufted, perennial grass, stems 0.3-1.5 m long.

Burrakar, Kurz (CAL); Burdwan 14-10-1894, Nasker 1201 (CAL); Ranigunj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1137, over the hill (CAL).

Imperata cylindrica (Linn.) P. Beauv. var. major (Nees) C. E. Hubbard ex Hubb. et Vaughan

This variety has not been mentioned by Prain. But this variety covers very large areas, particularly in Bengal. The grass is used as a raw material for paper making (Bor l.c.).

Ischaemum indicum (Houtt.) Merrill

A tufted grass.

Panagarh military farm, Bengal, 17-1-1956, Nanda 303 (CAL).

I. rugosum Salisb.

It is common in rice field, flowers at the end of the rains. It is eaten by cattle.

Mnesithea laevis (Retz.) Kunth

A slender, erect grass, 0.6-1.2 m in height. Burdwan, Dutta 590 (CAL).

Pseudosorghum fasciculare (Roxb.) A. Camus A slender, annual grass, stems 0.6-0.9 m in height. Burdwan Raj College, Burdwan 115 (CAL).

Rottboellia exaltata Linn. f.

Plants are large and beset with stiff, tuberclebased hairs. Flowers at the end of the rains. Burdwan, Dutta 554 (CAL).

Saccharum spontaneum Linn.

A tall, erect, perennial grass, 1.5-6.0 m in height, with a stout root stock. This species flowers and fruits at the end of the rains. It is a troublesome weed.

Burdwan, Dutta 641 (CAL).

Schizachyrium exile (Hochst.) Stapf

An erect, slender, annual grass.

Burrakar, 10-12-1874, Clarke 25247 E (CAL).

Vetiveria zizanioides (Linn.) Nash.

A densely tufted grass, stems 0.6-1.5 m high, with stout spongy aromatic roots.

Burdwan, 14-10-1894, Nasker 1197 (CAL); Raniganj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1135 (CAL).

Tribe: Maydeae

Coix lacryma-jobi Linn.

A perennial grass, often reaching a length of 1.5 m prostrate. Common along water courses.

Tribe: Paniceae

Alloteropsis cimicina (Linn.) Stapf

This is a delicate annual grass, 0.3-0.6 m high, appears towards the ends of the rains.

Brachiaria distachya (Linn.) Stapf

It is a branched straggling and creeping grass, with a height 0.3-0.6 m. A weed of the way side and waste places.

B. kurzii (Hook. f.) A. Camus

An annual, decumbent, flaccid grass.

B. miliformis (Presl) A. Chase

This grass has not been mentioned by Hooker & Prain. It is growing abundantly near the cultivated ground. A troublesome weed.

B. reptans (Linn.) Gard. et C. E. Hubb.

A slender, annual grass, stems creeping and rooting below. A weed of cultivated ground and waste places.

It has not been mentioned by Hooker & Prain. This species is common in all way side places and open ground.

D. granularis (Trin.) Henr.

Growing in dry places. A fodder plant.

D. preslii (Kunth) Henr.

It has not been mentioned by Hooker, Prain or Mujumdar. A widely creeping, leafy, low grass.

A rather tall, slender grass.

D. stricta Roth ex Roem. et Schult.

Growing in lawns or in cultivated high lands.

Panagarh military area, 17-1-1956, Guha 304 (CAL); Raniganj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1112, growing below the hills (CAL).

Echinochloa colonum (Linn.) Link

It is usually found in damp soil, height 0.9 m. Flowers during and at the end of the rains. An obnoxious pest in the rice fields.

Baburbag, Burdwan town, 28-11-1966, Banerjee 4825, prostrate on the ground, common in damp soil, height 0.9 m (CAL); Burdwan, 14-10-1894, Nasker 1181 (CAL); Raniganj, 11-10-1894, Nasker 1142 (CAL).

Hymenachne pseudointerrupta C. Muell.

This grass is found along the margins of the bheels and rice fields.

Oplismenus burmannii (Retz.) P. Beauv.

A small annual grass, culms very slender, upto .5 m high. It appears under the shed of trees. It is a fodder grass.

Golaphag, Burdwan, 28-11-1966, Banerjee 4829, semi-prostrate, it grows by the side of old ghat structure (CAL); Eden Canal, Burdwan, 16-10-1894, Nasker 1207 (CAL); Raniganj, 11-10-1894, Nasker 1158 (CAL).

Panicum atrosanguineum Hochst. ex A. Rich.

A dwarf annual grass. It has not been mentioned by Prain, Majumdar or Chaudhuri. It is the first time reported from Bengal by Jain (1966).

Damodar canal bank, Burdwan, 14-7-1964, Dutta 447 (CAL).

P. austroasiaticum Ohwi

A small, slender, tufted annual grass.

P. psilopodium Trin. var. psilopodium

An annual, sub-aquatic, tall grass with greenish panicles.

P. repens Linn.

A perennial grass, extensively creeping stolons, are abundant on the banks of tanks or marshes.

P. trypheron Schult.

A tufted annual grass. Flowers during the rains. Burrakar, Burdwan, 27-9-1893, Clarke 21142e (CAL); Eden Canal, Burdwan, 16-10-1894, Nasker 1223 (CAL); Raniganj, 11-10-1894, Nasker 1164 (CAL).

Paspalidium flavidum (Retz.) A. Camus

A very common annual grass. An obnoxious weed.

P. punctatum (Burm.) A. Camus

A perennial grass, average height 0.6 m. At the time of want, local people cooked as a substitute for rice (Information taken from local people).

Aftab Road, Burdwan, 28-11-1966, Banerjee 4823, height 0.6 m, common in damp soil by the side of paddy fields (CAL); Raniganj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1124 (CAL); Burdwan, 13-10-1894, Nasker 1193 (CAL).

Paspalum scrobiculatum Linn.

An annual grass, height upto 1.5 m long. It is a poisonous grass.

Pennisetum pedicellatum Trin.

An annual grass, branching, 0.3-0.9 m in height. Burdwan Raj College 140 (CAL).

Pseudoraphis spinescens (R. Br.) Vickery var. depauperata (Nees) Bor

A floating, aquatic grass.

Raniganj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1131 (CAL).

Sacciolepis indica (Linn.) A. Chase

An annual grass of wet places.

Eden Canal, Burdwan, 16-10-1894, Nasker 1213 (CAL); Raniganj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1136 (CAL).

Setaria glauca (Linn.) P. Beauv.

An annual grass of grassy places. It is best developed during the monsoon.

Cultivated, annual grass, height 0.9 m. It is commonly called "Italian millet".

Setaria tomentosa (Roxb.) Kunth

An annual grass, found in damp and shady places. Raniganj, 11-10-1894, Nasker 1161 & 1155 (CAL).

S. verticillata (Linn.) P. Beauv.

This grass has not been mentioned by Prain. It is a low shrubby, annual plant.

Burdwan, 16-10-1894, Nasker 1217 (CAL).

Sub-family : POOIDEAE Tribe : Aristideae

Aristida adscensionis Linn.

A tufted, annual or perennial, wiry grass.

Burdwan, 14-10-1894, Nasker 1200 (CAL); Raniganj, 11-10-1894, Nasker 1149 (CAL).

A. redacta Stapf

A tufted, annual, dry land grass.

Burrakur 152.4 m, Burdwan, 27-9-1873, Clarke 21115 and 21115B (CAL).

A. setacea Retz.

A stout, erect, perennial grass. A xerophytic plant.

Taldanga Bunglow, near Burrakar, May, 1865, Kurz (CAL).

Tribe: Bambuseae

Bambusa bambos (L.) Voss

A tall, thick set bamboo, stems 24.4-30.4 m long. Cultivated occasionally in the district.

Dendrocalamus strictus Nees

A close-set bamboo, stems 6-15 m height, often solid. This strong elastic bamboo is used for building purposes.

Burdwan district, Dutta 617 (CAL).

Tribe: Chlorideae

Chloris dolichostachya Lagasca

A tall, perennial grass, average height 0.9 m. It flourishes in damp places in the forest and can stand shade. A good fodder grass.

Golaphag old ghat, Burdwan, 28-11-1966, Banerjee 4830, it grows abundantly by the side of old ghat structure, height 0.9 m (CAL).

Cynodon arcuatus J. S. Presl ex C. B. Presl

This species is often confused with Cynodon dactylon. This plant is recently reported from Bengal by Jain (1966).

Burdwan, 14-10-1894, Nasker 1180 (CAL).

C. barberi Rang. et Tad.

This species is closely allied to Cynodon dactylon. Jain (1966) has reported this species from Bengal. Bagila, wet rice field, Burdwan, 14-7-1964, Dutta 462 (CAL).

C. dactylon (Linn.) Pers.

A slender, perennial, creeping grass. It is one of the best lawn and fodder grasses.

Dactyloctenium aegyptium (Linn.) P. Beauv.

An annual grass with an average height 0.6 m. Common as a weed in cultivated fields and open places. It is a poisonous grass.

Golaphag, Burdwan, 28-11-1966, Banerjee 4827, grows in long area on grassy lawn, height, 0.6 m (CAL); Burdwan, 14-10-1894, Nasker 1191 & 1199 (CAL); Raniganj, May, 1865, Kurz (CAL).

Desmostachya bipinnata (Linn.) Stapf

A tall, stout, stoloniferous, perennial grass. A ring of it is worn when performing certain ceremonies, among which the *Sradh* ceremony is the chief (*Bor* l.c.).

Taldanga Bunglow, near Burrakar, May, 1865, Kurz, sandy stony places (CAL); Burdwan, 22-5-1870, Clarke 11738 (CAL).

Eleusine indica (Linn.) Gaertn.

A sporadic annual grass which appears in quantity on cultivated ground where it grows with great rapidity with the advent of rains. It is a poisonous grass.

Centre of Golapbag, Burdwan, *Banerjee*, 4834, o.2 m (CAL); Eden Canal, Burdwan, 16-10-1894, *Nasker* 1220 (CAL); Raniganj 13-10-1894, *Nasker* 1140 (CAL).

Eragrostis coarctata Stapf apud Hook. f.

A tufted, perennial grass, 0.1-0.4 m height. This is a xerophytic grass and grows in sandy places.

Burrakar, Burdwan, Bengal, 243.8 m, 26-9-1873, Clarke 20778 D (CAL); Burrakar, very common on the sandy plains near Burrakar, March, 1865, Kurz (CAL).

E. diarrhena (Schult.) Steud.

A tall, perennial grass.

Tejgunj, Burdwan, 12-5-1960, Dutta 161 (CAL).

E. diplachnoides Steud.

A tall, stout, branching, perennial grass.

Idilpur, Burdwan, 6-5-1960, Dutta 118 (CAL).

E. gangetica (Roxb.) .Steud.

A tall, suberect, perennial grass, height 30 cm-1 m. It is a fodder grass.

Raniganj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1139, below the hills (CAL); Taldanga Bunglow near Burrakar, May, 1865, Kurz (CAL); Panagarh Military Station, West

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Bengal, 17-1-1956, Madhuram 305 (CAL); Raniganj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1119 & 1120 (CAL); common on the sandy plains about Burrakar, July, 1865, Kurz (CAL).

Eragrostis japonica (Thunb.) Trin.

A slender, graceful, perennial grass.

Eden Canal, Burdwan, 16-10-1894, Nasker 1222 (CAL); Burdwan, Burrakar, 182.8 m, 7-12-1874, Clarke 25249 A (CAL); Raniganj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1123 (CAL).

E. riparia (Willd.) Nees

A slender, graceful annual grass.

Burdwan, Dutta 636 (CAL).

E. tenella (Linn.) P. Beauv. ex Roem. et Schult. var. tenella

A slender, graceful, annual grass, found in waste and wet grounds.

Middle of the East bank of Krishnasagar, Burdwan, 28-11-1966, Banerjee 4826, semiprostrate, height 0.3 m (CAL); Burdwan, 14-10-1894, Nasker 1183 (CAL); Raniganj, 11-10-1894, Nasker 1156 (CAL).

E. tremula Hochst. ex Steud.

A densely tufted, annual grass.

Damodar river, 28-11-1891, Prain (CAL).

E. unioloides (Retz.) Nees ex Steud.

It is easily recognised from the pinkish or purplish or sometimes pale spikelets. The species is very common in grazing ground. It is a fodder grass.

Isachne albens Trin.

This grass has not been mentioned by Prain or Majumdar but very recently it has been recorded by Chaudhuri.

Oryza sativa Linn.

An annual crop, cultivated all over Burdwan district, West Bengal as "Dhan",

Tribe: Perotideae

Perotis indica (Linn.) O. Ktze.

A slender grass with leafy stem.

Tribe: Sporoboleae

Sporobolus diander (Retz.) P. Beauv.

Slender, smooth and glabrous, 0.9 m tall, very common.

Raniganj, Bengal, Aug., 1898, Gage (CAL); Raniganj, 11-10-1894, Nasker 1114 (CAL); Raniganj, 12-10-1894, Nasker 1134 & 1138 (CAL); Raniganj, 10-10-1894, Nasker 1192 (CAL); Burdwan 14-10-1894, Nasker 1195 (CAL); Taldanga Bunglow near Burrakar, sandy plains, common, May, 1865, Kurz (CAL); Baburbag, Burdwan, 28-11-1966, Banerjee 4824, grows abundantly in damp soil, average height 0.9 m (CAL).

S. tremulus (Willd.) Kunth

A small, stoloniferous grass, stems 0.6-1.8 m erect or prostrate.

Raniganj, May, 1865, Kurz (CAL).

Tribe: Triticeae

Hordeum vulgare Linn.

Cultivated.

Triticum aestivum Linn. Cultivated.

Tribe: Zoysieae

Tragus biflorus Schult.

A low, rigid, perennial grass. Raniganj, Bengal, Aug., 1898, Gage (CAL).

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
